

From the Music Room......

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The Kindergarten classes at the Elementary Center have been exploring rhythm in music. They are very good at reading quarter notes and eighth notes, and they were introduced to the quarter rest. Our 🖁 kindergarteners can read and play rhythm patterns on the classroom percussion instruments. They will soon be composing their own patterns to play! The kindergarteners enjoy singing the songs: Popping Corn, Bingo and Dr. Suess We Love Уои.

Our First Graders at the Elementary Center composed their own rhythm patterns using quarter notes and eighth notes and they were able to read and play their patterns. The first graders have also been exploring the instruments of the percussion family. By sight and sound, they are able to identify the classroom percussion instruments we have in the music room, as well as many orchestral percussion instruments. Let's Go Driving, One More River, and Chicken Soup with Rice are a few of their favorite songs.

The Second Grade classes at the Elementary Center know how a melody is created from pitches and how pitches make up a scale. They know the syllable names of the scale (do,re,mi,fa,so,la,ti,do) and that a melody can move up, down, and repeat. Using three of the scale's pitches (do, mi and so) they were able to compose their own melody! Our second grader really like singing "Do - Re - M/" from The Sound of Music. Soon they will be introduced to the brass family of instruments and have the opportunity to hear live brass instruments played by our student teacher, Mr. Dovensky!



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Our Third Graders at the Elementary Center have recently been 🐉 🖁 reviewing the families of instruments and exploring the brass and woodwind families. Mr. Dovensky shared the sights and sounds of his $\frac{1}{2}$ trumpet and flugelhorn and the third graders learned the parts of those instruments and explored how the sound is created in a brass 🥻 instrument. They were also able to 🕏 instrument. They were also able to see and hear a real clarinet; they heard its' range and compared its' sound (tone color) to the trumpet and flugelhorn. The third graders found out that the clarinet was used a lot in the recording of "When I'm Sixty-Four" by the Beatles.

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The Fourth Grade classes at the Elementary Center will soon take their first playing test on the recorder. They will be tested on playing, "Merrily We Roll Along", found in their Best in Class recorder book. This song uses the pitches B, A, and G. I can tell that many of them have been practicing! Our fourth graders have been singing in harmony. They can sing "Sandy McNab" in ny. I ney can sing Sandy McNab" in had a three-part round, and they will be learning other songs to sing in harmony. Mr. Dovensky shared the sights and sounds of his trumpet and flugelhorn and the fourth graders learned the parts of those instruments and explored how the sound is created in a brass instrument.

The music room welcomes Mr. Dovensky to our school. Mr. Dovensky is a student teacher from **Mercyhurst University and** he will be teaching music at the Elementary Center for seven weeks. He has been with us since the end of January and the students and I have really enjoyed having him here with us, exploring the world of music. Mr. Dovensky's major instrument is the trumpet. He has and will be sharing his knowledge and talent with the students throughout his time here with us. Welcome Mr. **Dovensky!**

CCIS, the subsidized child care program helps low-income families with the cost of child care

Basic Guidelines:

- · You must live in Pennsylvania
- Meet Income Guidelines for your family size
- Work 20 hours or more a week or— work 10 hours and in a school/training program for 10 hours a week
- Have a promise of a job that will start in 30 days
- · Have a child that needs care while you work or attend an education program
- Child eligible from birth –12 years of age.
- · Teen parents enrolled in a full time education program

No "Waiting List"

- Currently CCIS of Erie County does not have a waiting list for low income subsidized child care funding.
- Applications can be made by phone or online line at Compass.

Income Guidelines

The Annual income for a family to be eligible to receive child care subsidy is 200% of the Federal Poverty Income Guidelines

- Summer care only applications being accepted April 1

Second Grade News

February was such a busy month! It's hard to believe that we are beginning the month of March! Second grade has been fine-tuning our second grade skills and trying new things. As we review some of our mastered skills, it becomes apparent how much we have learned this year already!

Reading and writing will keep us busy as we revisit nonfiction text and apply what we've learned about text features to become better readers and writers. In doing this we have found that distinguishing between facts and opinions can become a little tricky (especially if we agree with a specific opinion). Paragraph structures are becoming more detailed with introductions and conclusions. This has been an amazing transition. Writing about and reading about nonfiction texts has also allowed us to determine main idea and details more easily. Practicing this skill at home, using the homework books, will be helpful.

Math brought us time and money in February, but in March we will begin to look at many Geometry skills. Geometry skills will encourage more vocabulary and more reading in our math class. This will be another opportunity to show off our reading and phonics skills as we explore shapes and patterns.

As the weather begins to warm up (hopefully) this month, we will try to get outside more often. Please remind your child to dress for the weather. Snow pants, boots, gloves/mittens, hat, a coat are required to play in the snow! Let's hope for an early spring!



FOURTH GRADE NEWS

The fourth grade students are working on argumentative writing in writing class. The students were to choose a topic to write about and try to persuade their reader to take action. The students are planning, drafting, editing, and publishing their argumentative essay.

The Fourth Grade Science students have been studying electricity by constructing series and parallel circuits. They will also be experimenting with switches and their use. Next, they will be experimenting with magnets and the magnetic field. They will then work with potential and kinetic energy. The students are enjoying the hands-on class.

In Reading class, we are practicing our strategies for the PSSA's. Also, we are gearing up to celebrate Dr. Seuss week.

In Math, we are practicing strategies to use for our PSSA tests and we are writing to explain the math prompts.

PSSA's will begin March 25th!
